The difference wasn't production quality or clever marketing—it was **simply showing up together**. People resonate deeply with seeing married couples build something real together—especially in business—because it quietly communicates trust, alignment, and long-term stewardship.

For leaders and founders, there's a subtle but important takeaway: **authentic family presence isn't a distraction from your brand—it can be a multiplier**. If you're building something meant to last, don't underestimate the credibility that comes from letting people see who you're building it with.

Birmingham is quietly seeing a meaningful shift in how economic development is being done: **public capital is being placed in the hands of proven private leaders to drive real outcomes.** [Shegun Otolana](#), Founder & CEO of Harmony Venture Labs—and featured speaker at the [YBL 2025 Fall Breakfast](#)—recently announced a [\\$5M Innovate Alabama commitment](#) to launch a venture [studio and fund](#) focused on building scalable, corporate-driven startups across Alabama, while [Kim Lee](#), Founder & CEO of Forge, secured a [City of Birmingham Bold Grant](#) to launch a 12-week Small Business Accelerator, fully funding 10 local businesses to strengthen operations using the *Traction* framework. Together, these moves signal a growing model where public funding activates private expertise to produce durable businesses, stronger operators, and long-term regional impact.



I get asked often about **when the right time is to apply for Lion's Den**—and with [applications now open in Dallas and Birmingham on the horizon](#), for many founders that time is now. The **Lion's Den DFW 2026 Pitch Competition** is currently accepting applications, making this an ideal moment to step forward if you're building a faith-driven, redemptive venture with real traction.

For those focused on **Birmingham**, the local [The Lion's Den](#) application portal is expected to open **around May**, making this season especially valuable for preparation and positioning.
